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HIJAB CONTROVERSY

Voices from Assam school: 'Good that girls have spoken their mind'

EVERY MORNING, before entering her school, 15-year-old Mahmouida Begum takes off her hijab, folds it neatly before storing it in her school bag. After school, when she steps out, the hijab is fished out of the bag, wrapped around her head, before she heads home.

Begum, a Class 9 student, says it would be "much less hassle" if the hijab was allowed in school, but adds: "Rules are rules, our teachers have a point to it."

In Jura Higher Secondary School, established in 1948, several Muslim girls find themselves in a similar quandary, caught between the duty to their families and religious beliefs to wear the hijab and school rules that state that nothing apart from uniform - white kurta and green dupatta for girls, white shirt and green trousers for boys - must be worn.

Asfya Sultan, 15, Begum's friend and classmate, says that she "feels bad" since the hijab is a "part of her identity". "It is something I wear at home, a part of my identity. Our families want us to wear it, elders on the road chide us if we wear it. Then when we come to school, we are not allowed to," she says.

More than 3,000 km away from Karnataka, where a controversy over the hijab is playing out, girls like Sultan and Begum find an echo. "I do not know the details but it is good that the girls have spoken their mind," says Sultan, on the Karnataka issue.

Located in Assam's Nagaon district, Jura is home to a sizeable Bengali Muslim population of migrant origin, with several Assamese Hindu pockets. Given Assam's sensitive identity battles between those considered "indigenous" and those perceived as "outsiders", locals are only too aware of these differences, and are

conscious about maintaining inter-community peace. This applies to Jura High School too, with its 1,000-odd students, out of whom about 483 are girls. "Everyone is sensitive to the historical faultlines here," says principal Rupali Sharma, who has taught in the school for three decades. "Our rules strictly say that a dress code should be followed, and it is an unwritten rule that hijabs, burqas or any other outside attire... jeans for that matter... will not be allowed," she says. So if students are ever seen wearing the hijab, members of the faculty gently

WITH SCHOOLS and colleges shut for three days in Karnataka, tension that arose on Tuesday following a face-off between girl students from the Muslim community demanding their right to wear hijab to classrooms and a competing demand from Hindu youth to wear saffron shawls eased around colleges on Wednesday. The police have arrested 15 people across the state on charges of breaching peace and harmony, mainly from Shivamogga and Bagalkot districts.

Although tension eased in the coastal district of Udupi, where the protests have been most acute, restrictions under CIPC Section 144 were imposed in Shivamogga district, where a saffron flag was hoisted at a college on Tuesday.

Starting that the government will initiate action against those behind the hijab row, state Education Minister B C Nagesh accused the trouble-makers of being responsible for the controversy. He said investigation is under way to initiate action against the outfits.

Hours after his statement, the CFI addressed the media in Udupi and they said they are supporting the hijab movement. Athavala Purnakalate, state president of Campus Front of India, said the organisation is leading the hijab issue in order to uphold constitutional rights of the students in a legal manner.

"The Education Minister is making baseless allegations about the CFI. It is highly commendable," Purnakalate said. "The Sangh Parivar and ABVP atrocities are being covered up by the minister; everyone knows who is behind the trouble that took place on Tuesday when Karnataka High Court was hearing the case."

Tension ebbs with closure; 15 held across Karnataka

state Home Department, confrontation and violent incidents broke out in seven colleges of five districts in the state on Tuesday. Protests were staged in 55 colleges in 19 districts. Home Minister Araga Janardhana said there is an attempt to foment trouble in the state through the hijab row. Besides students, some outsiders are also involved and action will be taken against them, he said.

"We have to take police not to take serious action against the students who do not know. There are communal and political forces behind it. I have spoken to DGP Praveen Sood and the intelligence department as well. After the arrest, there are no students; they are only outsiders. Investigation is pending, and we are yet to ascertain whether they (arrested people) are part of any organisation," Janardhana said.

On Wednesday, some Hindu organisations gave a call for a banh in Rakabavi-Banahatti town of Bagalkot district to condone the violence. Primary schools functioned as usual across the state without any interruption, and most colleges returned to online mode.

Pak summons Indian diplomat on hijab row

New Delhi: Pakistan Foreign Ministry on Wednesday summoned the Indian Charge d'Affaires in Islamabad and conveyed the Pakistan government's "grave concern and condemnation" on the "deeply reprehensible act" of banning Muslim girls students from wearing hijab in Karnataka.

It was also emphasised that the Government of India must fulfill its responsibility to hold the perpetrators of harassment against women in Karnataka to account and take adequate measures to ensure safety, security and well-being of Muslim women," a Pakistan Foreign ministry statement said.

House panel questions officials over ban on Kerala news channel

A PARLIAMENTARY panel Wednesday questioned senior officials of the Ministry of Home Affairs and the Ministry of Information and Broadcasting on the revocation of the broadcast licence of Malayalam news channel MediaOne over security concerns.

It is headed by VSK Kamudi, Special Secretary (Internal Security) in the MHA, and Apurva Chandra, I&B Secretary, were called by the Standing Committee on Communications and Information Technology, headed by Congress leader Shashi Tharoor, and asked about the MediaOne issue.

On January 31, the I&B Ministry denied security clearance by the MHA, had revoked the uplink and downlink permission granted to Madhyamam Broadcasting Limited which operates MediaOne channel.

The channel approached the Kerala High Court. On Tuesday, a single-judge bench upheld the Centre's ban on its telecast, saying the MHA decision to deny security clearance to the channel

followed intelligence "inputs" and was "justified". The channel has now approached a division bench of the High Court.

Details of House panel proceedings are not disclosed on the ground that it is privileged information. The committee has 29 members - 20 from Lok Sabha and 9 from Rajya Sabha.

The agenda of the meeting Wednesday, according to the Lok Sabha website, was on evidence from the Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology and Ministry of Home Affairs representatives on the subject 'Safeguarding citizens' rights and prevention of misuse of social/online news media platforms including special emphasis on women security in the digital space'. It also included a briefing by I&B Ministry officials and evidence of MHA on the subject 'Review of functioning and outreach of Doodarshan Channels'.

Officials in the ministries of Home and I&B decided to comment on the MediaOne issue, saying the matter is sub judice since an appeal has been filed. They pointed out that even the single-judge bench, in its ruling, did not disclose the reasons for denial of security clearance.

MP backtracks day later, says no proposal to ban hijab in educational institutions

MADHYA PRADESH government on Wednesday said no proposal is being considered to ban hijab in educational institutions of the state, a day after School Education Minister Indar Singh Parmar stated that hijab is not a part of uniform and that a state uniform code will be implemented in the next academic session.

On Wednesday, Parmar also issued a statement, saying that his remarks were "wrongly interpreted".

State Home Minister Narotam Mishra clarified that there was no proposal under consideration regarding hijab in Madhya Pradesh. "There is no controversy over hijab in Madhya Pradesh. So there should be no confusion in this regard," Mishra told reporters. When asked about the Karnataka protests, he said the matter was related to that state and is pending before the High Court there.

Senior BJP leader Uma Bharti, meanwhile, tweeted, "The Karnataka hijab row has taken a political and communal turn. In a bid to stop this, leaders of opposition must stop their comments on the issue whereas the state government should soon reach a solution while considering the independence of educational institutes and rights of common citizens."

BJP national general secretary Kalish Vajpayee also tweeted on the issue. "The attempt being made to spread religious hysteria in Karnataka schools by insisting on wearing hijab is inappropriate. A school has its own dress code and it should be strictly followed." Meanwhile, Parmar issued a video statement, saying his remarks about the school uniform was related to "uniformity, discipline and identity of schools". "Some people wrongly interpreted my remarks and pretended it with a wrong reference. I am denying it. We are not going to implement a new uniform code. There is no work under the way in this direction. Present arrangement in schools regarding the uniform will continue," he said.

Maharashtra new wine policy: Anna Hazare announces hunger strike

SOCIAL ACTIVIST Anna Hazare has announced an indefinite hunger strike from February 14 to protest against the Maharashtra cabinet decision to allow sale of wine in supermarkets and walk-in stores.

On January 27, the state cabinet passed a proposal to allow

the sale of wine at supermarkets and walk-in shops with an area of over 1,000 square feet. "The state government seems to have taken this decision keeping in mind revenue benefits and the interests of wine-producers and sellers. But the government does not seem to have considered the that this could lead to increased alcohol addiction among children and young-

sters and trouble for women. This is lamentable," said Hazare adding that there was no option for him but to oppose the decision. He said although numerous organisations including his own Bharatnagar Virodh Jan Andolan has come out against the decision, the government has not indicated its willingness to reconsider the decision. "In such a situation, I can see

no alternative to an agitation," said Hazare in the letter sent to Chief Minister Uddhav Thackeray. He said he will soon call a meeting of like-minded organisations from across the state and decide the future course of action. "Our saints and national heroes have taken efforts to con-

serve and strengthen our culture. Wine is not in it. In spite, then this culture will perish, hedonism will grow. It's impossible to foresee what all trouble this decision will cause. Hence, to avoid witnessing the downfall of the culture of Maharashtra, I will observe Ralegan Siddhi from February 14," said Hazare.
